SISC CAMPUS COMES ALIVE AS STUDENTS RETURN

Eager Grades 1–3, 12 and International Baccalaureate 2 students traded their computer screens for seeing their teachers and classmates faceto-face in the pilot implementation of on-site classes in Southville International School and Colleges (SISC). After almost two years of remote learning, students and teachers were reunited in-person since classes were suspended due to the COVID-19 outbreak.

Returning students with signed parental consent went through health screening and temperature checking at the Munich Campus gate before following direction markers on the floor to their classrooms. Necessary public health safeguards are in place like hand sanitizer stations, physical distance signage, upgraded ventilation, increased cleaning measures and mask mandate.

"It is wonderful to see our classrooms active again with the return of our students after two challenging years," said SISC President, Dr. Jocelyn Tizon. "The school hasn't been the same without our students so we'll make sure all COVID-19 safety protocols are observed to secure a safe and healthy campus environment for everyone."

Archon Connor Sky Dolor and Jenica Beatrice Roque of Gr. 3 Courtesy won the gold award for belonging in the top 8% of their level while Gabriel Dino of Gr. 2 Franklin, Nikolai Isaac Eusebio of Gr. 4 Charity and Akita Julia Beredo of Gr. 5 Loyalty bagged the silver award for placing in the next 16%.

Getting the bronze award were Audrey Maeve Javier and Julian Marius Hermanos of Gr. 2 Franklin, and Mason Perez, Marcus Emmanuel Sybingco and Anya Vyas of Gr. 4 Charity for finishing in the next 24%. Yuki Togawa of Gr. 3 Peace and Subin Cho of Gr. 4 Hope, meanwhile, were given the participation award in the competition joined by teams from Australia, Cambodia, Hong Kong, Kyrgyzstan, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam.


























RETURN TO SCHOOL SURVEY FOR AY 2022-2023

COVID-19 and Diabetes

The pandemic has shown, that in general, people with diabetes have a higher risk of developing severe symptoms and complications when infected with COVID-19. From the Two main types of diabetes. Type 1 has a higher risk from getting very sick from the virus than Type 2.

Given that people with diabetes are considered a vulnerable group, the following measures for protecting oneself against COVID-19 must be followed:

- Washing of hands
- Wearing of masks
- Ventilating indoor habitat
- Socializing with people outdoors whenever possible
- Keeping safe physical distance
- Getting vaccinated.
- Monitoring health daily.

To make sure diabetes stays well-managed in order to limit risk during the pandemic:

- 1. Continue to make healthy choices
 - Take medications consistently and on time
 - Stay active.
 - Limit snacking.
 - 2. Monitor blood sugar closely
 - 3. Do not skip check-ups with diabetes care team
