Students take SBA pretest







Southville International School and Colleges (SISC) students from senior kinder to grade 10 recently took the Standards-Based Assessment (SBA) Pre-Test to get a profile of where they are in English, Science and Math. The tests will also show to the school the specific areas to work on to ensure that all learners will meet the standards for success.

Developed by the **Asian Psychological Services and Assessment**, the SBA test measures **student achievement and competencies** in the core subject areas: **English Language Arts** (Reading, Writing, and Media), **Mathematics** (Numbers and Number Sense Operations, Measurement, Patterns and Algebra, Geometry, Statistics and Probability) and **Science** (Earth and Space, Life Science, Physical Science, and Nature of Science).

With standards-based assessment, students, teachers, parents, and school administrators will get the following **BENEFITS**:

- 1. The SBA provides **good feedback** to the student on how well he/she has learned and the degree of his/her **readiness to move** to a higher educational level.
- 2. The SBA pinpoints **competencies** of students and **learning gaps** which serve as bases for learning reinforcement or remediation.
- 3. The SBA will determine the **performance** of SISC students against **school**, **national** and **international** norms.

Results of the assessment can also aid teachers and the school to identify the areas of strengths and developmental areas which consequently can provide information for improvement of the institution's curriculum. Furthermore, the SBA provides objective and relevant feedback to the school in terms of its quality and effectiveness of instruction against national norms and international standards.

4th National Reading Conference Concludes with Resounding Success



The 4th National Reading Conference of Southville Global Education Network (SGEN) and the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU) gathered educators, school administrators, and librarians to share and discuss innovative ideas and strategies to inspire learners to foster a greater love for reading. Held via Zoom at South Mansfield College, the conference brought together over two hundred participants from across the country who were empowered to engage and motivate their students to become life-long readers, and enhance the reading competencies and literacy programs in their respective schools.

TOLERANCE

Children who are taught to respect others will be able to face conflict much more confidently. This is because they will comprehend the value of tolerance and learn more effective conflict resolution techniques. communicate effectively and take responsibility for their own mistakes.

LISTENING

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
Anaphylaxis (Severe Allergic Reaction)

What is anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. It can occur within seconds or minutes of exposure to something a person is allergic to. Anaphylaxis leads the immune system to release a flood of chemicals, which could lead one to go into shock—the blood pressure drops abruptly and the airways narrow, obstructing breathing.



Most common triggers for anaphylaxis in adult



Animal proteins (such as cow's milk, egg, finned fish and shellfish)

Venom from stinging insects (such as bee stings, wasps and yellow jackets)

Venom from insect bites (such as fire ants)



Pain medications (such as aspirin or ibuprofen)

Most common anaphylaxis triggers in children

Food allergies:













Tree nuts

Fish

Shellfish

Wheat

Soy milk

Signs and Symptoms

- · Hives or red, itchy skin
- Difficulty breathing
- Weak and rapid pulse
- Low blood pressure
- Stomach pain and/or nausea, vomiting or diarrhea
- Sweating, headache or dizziness
- Swollen tongue or difficulty swallowing
