Ervin Joshua **Bautista**, an International Baccalaureate (IB) student from Southville International School and Colleges (SISC), continues to shine on the global stage in the fields of mathematics and computer science. He has once again earned a spot in the 6-member Philippine team to compete in the 66th International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO), the world's oldest and most prestigious science Olympiad, to be held in **July 2025** in Sunshine Coast, Australia.

Further proving his prowess in international competitions, Bautista also secured Third Prize in the Senior Division of the European Mathematical Cup, hosted by the Young Gifted Mathematicians Marin Getaldić in Croatia. He successfully solved complex problems in algebra, combinatorics, geometry, and number theory during the grueling four-hour exam.









### VALUE OF THE WEEK

### HEALTH ADVISORY



Managing Bumps and Knocks at School

Children are naturally active at school, engaging in play, sports, and daily activities that may result in minor bumps or knocks. While most of these incidents are harmless, some can be more serious and require immediate attention.

#### **Common Causes**

- · Playground Accidents from swings, slides, monkey bars, or while running
- Sports-related injuries during physical education (PE), recess, or extracurricular activities
- · Collisions with classmates, walls, desks, doors, or school furniture
- · Slips, Trips, and Falls on staircases, wet floors, or uneven surfaces
- · Accidental hits from thrown objects, backpacks, or school equipment
- Student Interactions from rough play, pushing, or unintended physical contact

#### First Aid Response

- 1. Assess the Student Ask what happened and check for visible injuries.
- Apply a Cold Compress Use an ice pack (wrapped in cloth) on the affected area for 10-15 minutes.
- Monitor for Symptoms Observe the student for changes in behavior or alertness.
- Keep the Student Calm and Seated Avoid physical activity for at least 30 minutes.



#### PreventionTips

- ✓ Ensure Playground Safety Enforce safe play rules and proper equipment
  use
- Supervise High-Risk Areas Assign staff to monitor staircases, hallways, and playgrounds.
- Use Protective Gear Encourage helmets and safety equipment for sports as necessary.
- Maintain a Safe Environment Keep floors dry, remove obstacles, and ensure proper lighting.
- √ Educate Students on Safety Teach children the importance of safe play and conflict resolution.

A student should be sent to a healthcare provider if he/she:



Has persistent pain, swelling, or worsening symptoms



Shows behavioral changes like irritability, fatigue, or confusion



Complains of dizziness, nausea, or blurred vision



Has a history of concussions or previous head trauma or bleeding disorder

#### A student may stay in school under observation if he/she:

- Has a mild bump but feels fine and can resume normal activities
- Shows no signs of worsening symptoms after a short period of rest
